Background

Jesus has gone to Jerusalem for the Feast of Tabernacles. His teaching has caused quite a commotion. The rulers are more determined than ever to silence him. The people are curious, and some are coming to believe he is the Christ (John 7:40-43).

Background

In John chapter 9, we read that Jesus heals a man born blind. He does this on the Sabbath, so some of the Pharisees become very angry. Again the people are divided over who Jesus is. The man who had been blind comes to see who Jesus really is, but the leaders refuse to.

How does this saying of Jesus help us answer those who say there are many paths to God?

How does this passage help us understand why some people hear the Gospel but reject it?

Read John 10:11-21

4. What is Jesus saying about himself?
5. What will he do for his sheep?
6. What does the Father think about this?
7. Who are the "other sheep" in verse 16?

Let's see what the Old Testament has said about this.

Read Ezekiel 34:1-16

8. Who are the bad shepherds? What have they done?

9. What promises does God make to Israel?

Back to John chapter 10

10. What is Jesus saying about the Jewish leaders of his time?(v8)

11. Who is he claiming to be?

Read John 10:22-29

12. What promises does Jesus make about his sheep?

13. How has Jesus been a good shepherd to you?

14. In the NT we can see this shepherd/sheep analogy being applied to Christian leaders (John 21:15-17; 1Peter 5:1-4). How does this help us to pray for our leaders?

Read John 11:1-16

1. Describe the relationship between Jesus and this family.
2. Why does Jesus delay?
3. What are the disciples concerned about?
4. What do you think Jesus means in verses 9 & 10?

Read John 11:17-27

5. What is Martha asking for?
6. What is Jesus saying about himself?
7. What is he offering?
8. What do we learn from Martha's reply? (See also John 5:24-29)

Read Daniel 12:1-3

9. What would Martha have been expecting?

Back to John 11:28-37

10. What makes Jesus cry?

Read John 11:38-53

Whatever Martha was expecting, it wasn't this!

12. Why does Jesus bring Lazarus back from the dead? (v42,44, recall v4)

13. Describe the different reactions to this miracle.

5. Who is the vineyard?

Back to John 15:4-17

8. What does Jesus say about himself?

10. Think together about the vine/branch relationship. What does this mean for us?

11. What does Jesus want the disciple to do?

12. How do we do this? (v7, 10, 12, 13)

13. What does Jesus give us? (v7, 9, 11, 15)

14. What is the fruit that will last?

15. How can we help each other to abide/remain in Jesus?
